Chris Boyd

Christopher Boyd is the webmaster of Vitalsecurity.org, a Microsoft Security MVP and Security Research Manager for FaceTime Security Labs. Better known online as Paperghost, he has been involved in numerous high-profile spyware busts, including the discovery (and eventual shutdown) of rogue BitTorrent adware bundles, a mass Linux server hack that was used to infect Windows PCs, tracking a rogue Google Toolbar back to 2003, discovering a Rootkit buried in an IM bundle and tracing those same bundles back to a group operating out of the Middle-East.

Originating from Liverpool, England with a Honours Degree in Fine Art, Boyd moved into the field of security because of a close friend's life-altering encounter with an IM Trojan. Relaunching Vitalsecurity.org in mid-2004, it quickly became one of the primary resources in the fight against Spyware, by turns educating his readers and infuriating his targets. In his continued research with FaceTime, Boyd has featured on radio (The David Lawrence show) and in print (SCMagazine, IT Week), and maintains his grass-roots connections, serving as Admin to a number of major security forums including Spywarewarrior.com and the ASAP (Alliance of Security Analysis Professionals) alliance.

Boyd also writes at a number of other well known websites, including ReveNews.com and Spywareguide.com. He is frequently covered in the media, from Eweek to CNet, and has to date chalked up six appearances on Slashdot.org in less than twelve months - leading one pundit to half-jokingly refer to him as a "living Slashdot".

He still resides in Liverpool, and absolutely does not sound like a Beatle.

Michelle Boykins

Michelle Boykins is director of communications at the National Crime Prevention Council. She directs all operational aspects of the public service advertising for the National Citizens' Crime Prevention Campaign and its national symbols, McGruff the Crime Dog®, his nephew Scruff®, and the "Take A Bite Out Of Crime®" slogan. The million-dollar campaign provides a tremendous return on investment by receiving an average of \$60 million in donated media support. She oversees the public relations activities for the agency and ensures the development and dissemination of public service announcements (PSAs) for television, print, media, and outdoor advertising to media outlets across the country. She provides assistance to state agencies that want to promote the McGruff PSAs locally and works with the media to encourage support for the campaign. Eric Howes

Eric L. Howes is Director of Malware Research at Sunbelt Software. Before joining Sunbelt he taught for a number of years at both the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign and Parkland College in Champaign, IL.

Howes became known in the anti-spyware community for his testing and critiques of anti-spyware software at SpywareWarrior.com. He also maintained a personal web site at the University of Illinois to supply internet users with resources to protect their privacy and security on the internet. Among those resources were several utilities and "block lists" that Howes continues to update and maintain at SpywareWarrior.com.

In recognition of his work to help internet users protect their privacy and security, Microsoft awarded Howes its Most Valuable Professional Award (MVP Award). He attended the FTC's Spyware Workshop (April of 2004) and was a panelist at the CNET AntiSpyware Workshop (May 2005). Howes is currently finishing his M.S. in the Graduate School of Library and Information Science (GSLIS) at the University of Illinois.

Trevor Hughes

J. Trevor Hughes is an attorney specializing in ecommerce, privacy and technology law. Hughes serves as the Executive Director of the Network Advertising Initiative (the NAI) and the International Association of Privacy Professionals (the IAPP). In his role with the NAI, Hughes leads the NAI's efforts to create manageable standards for industry at the intersection of privacy and technology. He leads the NAI's Email Service Provider Coalition, an organization that is dedicated to developing technological and public policy tools to reduce spam and protect legitimate email. In his role with the IAPP, Hughes leads the world's largest association of privacy professionals.

Dr. Ponemon is a member of the National Board of Advisors of the Eller College of Business and Public Administration, University of Arizona. He serves on the Government Policy Advisory Committee and Co-Chair for the Internet Task Force for the Council of American Survey and Research Organizations (CASRO).

Dr. Ponemon consults with leading multinational organizations on global privacy management programs. He has extensive knowledge of regulatory frameworks for managing privacy and data security including health care, pharmaceutical, financial services, telecom and internet. Dr. Ponemon was appointed to the Advisory Committee for Privacy for the United States Federal Trade Commission. He was also appointed to two California State task forces on privacy and data security laws. In particular, he has filed a number of lawsuits and/or negotiated settlements based on unlawful conduct in the area of telecommunications and Internet law, including spamming, cramming, spyware, unsolicited facsimile advertising, deceptive telemarketing, and violations of the state's do not call statute. He has also appeared before the Texas Legislature as a resource witness on a number of occasions.

Ari Schwartz

Ari Schwartz is an Associate Director of the Center for Democracy and Technology (CDT). Ari's work focuses on increasing individual control over personal and public information. He promotes privacy protections in the digital age and expanding access to government information via the Internet. Ari regularly testifies before Congress and Executive Branch Agencies on these issues.

Prior to working at CDT, Ari worked at OMB Watch researching and analyzing the nonprofit sector's engagement in technology, government performance, access to government information, and government information technology policy.

Ed Skoudis

Ed Skoudis is a founder and Senior Security Consultant with Intelguardians, a Washington DC based information security consulting firm. Ed teaches SANS Hacker Techniques, Exploits and Incident Handling course on a regular basis. Ed's expertise includes hacker attacks and defenses, the information security industry, and computer

privacy issues. He has performed security assessments and designed information security governance and operations teams for Fortune 500 companies, and has provided rapid response to computer attacks for clients in financial, high technology, healthcare, and other industries. Ed conducted a demonstration of hacker techniques against financial institutions for the United States Senate and is a frequent speaker on issues associated with hacker tools and defenses. He has published several articles on these topics, as well as the Prentice Hall best selling book, *Counter Hack: A Step-by-Step Guide to Computer Attacks and Effective Defenses*. Cindy Southworth, MSW is the Director of Technology and Director of Safety Net: the National Safe & Strategic Technology Project at the National Network to End Domestic Violence (NNEDV). Through this project she addresses matters such as the risk to victims of placing court records on the Internet, the dangers of batterers intercepting escape plans through technology, privacy issues related to using cordless and cell phones, and how state and local programs serving victims can use technology wisely. She has worked to end violence against women for 15 years at national, state, and local advocacy organizations and has a lifetime of technology expertise.

Richard Stienon

Richard Stienon is a vice president of Threat Research for Webroot software. He is responsible for Webroot's research task forces to root out and define the next level of malicious software and attacks.

Before joining Webroot Mr. Stienon was VP Research at Gartner Inc. where he covered security topics including firewalls, intrusion detection, intrusion prevention, security consulting and managed security services for the Security and Privacy group. He is a holder of Gartner's Thought Leadership award for 2003 and was named "One of the 50 most powerful people in Networking" by NetworkWorld Magazine.

Mr. Stienon has more than 20 years of experience in industry. Prior to joining Gartner, he was with a dot-com that he headed up, which provided back-end, gift-certificate generation and fulfillment for major shopping centers. Before that, he was a manager in PricewaterhouseCooper's Technical Risk Services group. At PwC Mr. Stienon led security assessment engagements at major financial institutions, computer manufacturers, railroads and utilities. He wrote industry best practices for Internet and firewall security. He also was part of a small team that concentrated on PKI consulting. Mr. Stienon joined PwC from Netrex, a managed security provider acquired by ISS. There, he was director of business development and was instrumental in bringing Checkpoint software into the IPsec standards for VPN. He started his networking career when he formed one of the first ISPs in Michigan, which was focused on business clients.

Mr. Stiennon received a bachelor of science degree in aerospace engineering from the University of Michigan.

Orson Swindle

Orson Swindle was sworn in as a Commissioner on the Federal Trade Commission December 18, 1997.

Mr. Swindle has had a distinguished military career and served in the Reagan Administration from 1981 to 1989 directing financial assistance programs to economically distressed rural and municipal areas of the country. As Assistant Secretary of Commerce for Development he managed the Department of Commerce's national economic development efforts directing seven offices across the country. Mr. Swindle was State Director of the Farmers Home Administration for the U.S. Department of Agriculture financing rural housing, community infrastructure, businesses, and farming.

In 1992, Mr. Swindle became the first national leader of United We Stand America and in 1993 worked with Jack Kemp, Vin Weber, William Bennett and Ambassador Jeane Kirkpatrick to form Empower America. In 1994 and in 1996 he was a Republican candidate for Congress in Hawaii's 1st Congressional District.

As a Marine aviator serving in South Vietnam on November 11, 1966, Mr. Swindle was shot down from the skies over North Vietnam while flying his 205th and last combat mission. He was captured by the North Vietnamese and held Prisoner of War in Hanoi for the next six years and four months. On March 4, 1973, Mr. Swindle was released from captivity.

Mr. Swindle retired from the U.S. Marine Corps in 1979 with the rank of Lieutenant Colonel. His 20 military decorations for valor in combat include two Silver Stars, two Bronze Stars, and two Purple Hearts.

Mr. Swindle earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Industrial Management from Georgia Tech in 1959 and a Master of Business Administration from Florida State University in 1975.

Peter Swire

Peter P. Swire is the C. William O'Neill Professor of Law at the Moritz College of Law of the Ohio State University. He lives in the Washington, D.C. area, teaches in Ohio during the fall semester, and is Director of the law school's Washington, D.C. summer program. He serves as a consultant to the law firm of Morrison & Foerster LLP, with a focus on privacy and cybersecurity issues.

During the fall of 2005, Professor Swire is on sabbatical from Ohio State. For 2005-2006, he is a Visiting Senior Fellow at the Center for American Progress in Washington, D.C.

From 1999 until January, 2001 Professor Swire served as the Clinton Administration's Chief Counselor for Privacy, in the U.S. Office of Management and Budget. He was White House coordinator for the proposed and final HIPAA medical privacy rules, and played a leading role on topics including financial privacy, Internet privacy, encryption, public records and privacy, e-commerce policy, and computer security and privacy.

Professor Swire co-authored the book *None of Your Business: World Data Flows, Electronic Commerce, and the European Privacy Directive*, which was published by Brookings in 1998. He has published extensively and is quoted frequently in the national and international press. Many of his writings appear at www.peterswire.net. With Lawrence Lessig, he serves as Editor of the Cyberspace Law Abstracts of the Social Science Research Network.

Professor Swire graduated summa cum laude from Princeton University and in law school was a Senior Editor of the Yale Law Journal. He received a Rotary Fellowship to study European Community Law in Brussels in 1981-82 and clerked for Judge Ralph K. Winter, Jr., of the Second Circuit. He practiced in the Washington office of Powell, Goldstein, Frazer & Murphy from 1986 to 1990 before entering law teaching.

She was hired into the High-Tech Unit of the Consumer Protection Division by Attorney General Rob McKenna to litigate spyware, phishing, and identity theft cases. Suzi is also a nurse for a national disability management company.
